### Instructions for submitting an abstract

You are invited to submit an abstract before December 15th. **Acknowledgment of receipt will be sent automatically. If you do not receive any acknowledgment, please contact us again.**

For talks, a maximum of two abstracts will be accepted for each speaker. All authors of accepted abstracts must register and be paid in full by the early registration deadline (currently February 2018). Authors failing to comply with this rule will not be included in the Conference Programme.

Oral (spoken) presentations will be limited to 20 minutes: 15 minutes for presentation and 5 minutes for questions. Contributed oral presentations will be grouped by topic. If your abstract is accepted but cannot be accommodated as an oral presentation, we may offer you the opportunity to present a poster. All oral presentation rooms will be equipped with a computer and a data projector. Poster presenters will receive general instructions on poster format once the abstract is accepted. Detailed information and instructions on presentations at the meeting will be available to presenters several months before the meeting.

Abstract (limited to 150 words)	While systematic reviews and evidence syntheses of qualitative research are increasingly used, there remain misunderstandings about what characteristics they share, and where they differ, from traditional systematic reviews of quantitative evidence. This is particularly the case in conservation and environmental management fields, where few such qualitative evidence syntheses have been undertaken. This presentation will outline some key definitions, processes and misconceptions about

	<p>qualitative evidence synthesis and compare them to quantitative systematic reviews.</p> <p>Drawing on systematic review examples which have explored the connections between people's health and wellbeing and their interactions with nature (such as when undertaking conservation volunteering, or through the provision of gardens in care homes for people with dementia), this presentation will illustrate how such syntheses may be used, how they can complement and enhance understandings from the quantitative evidence base and provide examples of challenges for conduct and presentation.</p>
